WSC player remembered as 'fun loving'

WAYNE - Preliminary autopsy results show no signs that alcohol or a drug overdose was involved in the weekend death of an 18-year-old Wayne State College football player, authorities said Monday.

Eddie Key III's body was found Saturday evening in his dorm room on campus. Wayne Police Chief Marlen Chinn said it may take weeks before complete autopsy and toxicology results are available. Authorities said they believe Key died in his sleep sometime Saturday morning. He was last seen alive about 4 a.m. Saturday.

His coach at Wayne State, Dan McLaughlin, said he will remember Key as a gregarious, fun-loving guy.

McLaughlin said the Wildcats were taking Key's death hard, so he asked them in a team meeting Sunday to remember something about him that made them laugh or smile.

"Several players spoke up and spoke about fun times and fun things that Eddie had been a part of," McLaughlin said Monday. "There was actually some laughter, filled with tears, just remembering what a great guy and great friend he was.'

Key, who was 6-foot-2 and 270 pounds,

played both sides of the ball in high school, and he was an All-Nebraska second-team pick on the offensive line as a senior. He was projected to play on de-fense for the Wildcats after redshirting last fall

Key played computer games with some teammates in his dorm room at Berry Hall on Friday night. He had fallen asleep when they left around 4 a.m.

He apparently got up to lock his door because his friends couldn't get in the room Saturday night after he failed to answer their phone calls. A resident assistant opened the door, and that's when they found Key.

Medical personnel were called immediately, and they said he had been dead for several hours. The Wayne Police Department continues to investigate.

McLaughlin said the school was waiting to talk with his parents, Stephanie and Eddie, before they made plans for any type of service at Wayne.

"It is just so raw," McLaughlin said. The coach said Key became a popular player in his brief time with the team.

They are very sad and shocked, but resilient," McLaughlin said. "I'm proud of them. They'll be OK."

Two from Bassett injured in accident

Two people were injured early Sunday morning in a one-vehicle accident east of Norfolk.

Mike Prather, chief deputy sheriff with the Madison County sheriff's office, said the investigation revealed that a 2007 Ford pickup driven by Bryant Irish, 20, Bassett, had been westbound on East Norfolk Avenue.

The vehicle failed to negotiate a curve, entered the south ditch, struck a large concrete culvert and rolled, Prather said.

A passenger in the vehicle. Dillon Fales, 19, also of Bassett, was ejected from the vehicle during the collision, Prather said.

Both were transported to Faith Regional Health Services by Norfolk Fire & Rescue. Irish had cuts and shoulder injuries, and Fales sustained severe head injures.

Fales was later transported to Creighton University Medical Center in Omaha by Norfolk Ambulance Service.

The accident occurred about 12:55 a.m. on Sunday. Vehicle speed, icy road conditions and alcohol were believed to be contributing factors to the accident, Prather said.

Neither person was wearing a seatbelt. The Nebraska State Patrol and Norfolk Police Division assisted with the investigation, which is continuing.
